#### A SUMMARY OF THE BIBLE

The 7 Arrows guide both novice and experienced students of the Word through the basic mechanics of Bible study by asking a few key questions of any passage (see pages 10-11 for more information).

## 7 ARROWS OF BIBLE READING

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Our desire was to create a simple, reproducible strategy that would facilitate this process. This led us to develop a simply strategy for small clusters (2-3 people) to meet together regularly and talk about the Scriptures and apply them to their lives.

The seven arrows of Bible reading were an attempt at developing a tool for proper hermeneutics to power these relationships. We did not want our people to simply talk about the Bible. We wanted them to understand the Bible and know how to apply it to their lives. Each cluster would read a predetermined passage of Scripture and discuss it using these seven arrows.



What does this passage say?



What did this passage mean to its original audience?



What does this passage tell us about God?



What does this passage tell us about man?



What does this passage demand of me?



How does this passage change the way I relate to people?



How does this passage prompt me to pray?

**ARROW 1:** The goal was for the clusters to start by summarizing the main point of the passage as succinctly as possible, ideally in one sentence.

ARROW 2: Next, the clusters sought to discern authorial intent for the passage by asking what it meant to its original audience. Since a text of Scripture can never mean what it never meant, it is necessary to begin by discerning what the text meant. Often this may require the clusters to consult other study tools or cross-reference other biblical texts to arrive at the meaning of the text.

ARROW 3: Thirdly, we asked what the text tells us about the nature and character of God and specifically His work through the person and work of Jesus Christ.

ARROW 4: Fourthly, the text was analyzed to see what it tells us about humanity. Bryan Chappell refers to this as the "fallen condition focus" of the text. What does the text reveal about sin and humankind's need for the gospel?

ARROW 5: Then we moved the clusters to application. Since we had rooted the clusters in the meaning of the text, they were now positioned to rightly apply it's meaning to their lives.

ARROW 6: From there we wanted our clusters to apply the Scripture to their relationships with others. Ideally, they would discuss how the text shaped both how they related to other believers and how they lived on mission in the world.

ARROW 7: Finally, the clusters rooted their prayers in the Scriptures. Hopefully, the previous six arrows kindled the flames of passionate prayer in the lives of the clusters—both for their own sanctification and for their mission to the lost.

With this model, we touched on three important areas for discipleship:

**Scripture**—Disciple-making was rooted in a rightful understanding of Scripture and not in simply doing life together, unpacking another sermon, or dependence on classroom instruction.

**Simplicity**—Disciple-making was simple enough for everyone to get involved. All believers could take these principles, a Bible, and a relationship with a young Christian and get to work.

Stickiness—Disciple-making through understanding and applying Scripture was etched in the minds of our young church. They could use these same arrows not only to guide their cluster discussions but also their personal Bible study, small group leadership, and comprehension of sermons.

These arrows have proven to be a unique tool in our disciple-making toolbox that the Lord is using to call and build faithful and fruitful followers of Jesus.

Matt Rogers is the teaching pastor at The Church at Cherrydale in Greenville, South Carolina. His church developed the Seven Arrows tool to help people read and understand Scripture within their small groups. The concept has gone on to form the basis of a 52-week devotional for teens from Lifeway Students, the Seven Arrows Bible from B&H, and is now featured in The Gospel Project for Adults and Students.

# "Jesus Came and Stood Among Them"

I have loved hiking for as long as I can remember. My dad took me on weekend hikes as a kid. Sometimes we would hike through our local park, and other times we would drive a couple of hours to the North Carolina mountains to hike mountain tops or to take in the views of some beautiful waterfalls. Those were some of the sweetest memories I had with my dad in my childhood. Those early years with my dad developed a love that would continue to play a role in my life all the way through adulthood.

I'm just shy of turning 40 years old, but I still make a habit of getting out and hiking whenever I get the chance. I travel quite a bit as an evangelist, so I have had the chance to hike through some amazing stretches of God's creation. In the past couple of years, I have hiked through Zion National Park, the Alaskan Wilderness, the Appalachian Trail, and a few Sequoia groves. Our planet does not lack for beautiful reminders of the majesty and grandeur of God.

# GOD'S TRANSCENDENCE AND IMMANENCE

Each park has its own sense of beauty and wonder, but there are always two lessons that God stamps on my heart on every hike. Those are the lessons of God's transcendence and God's immanence. His transcendence is evident in every mountain peak and sunset vista. Our Creator God is so massively powerful that He brought the mountains, valleys, oceans and rivers into existence with just a spoken word. His creative work leaves me awestruck.

As much as I am floored by the immensity of both God's work and His character on these long hikes, I also come to the clear understanding of God's immanence—the fact that He is a God who is personal and near to me. That is a fact that is clear through a significant portion of Scripture, especially in Isaiah 7:14, where the promised Messiah is to be called Immanuel—God with us. That promise always stands, but there are times in

my life when the busyness and noise of life crowd out my grasp of that promise. Affording myself the chance to quiet the jumble of noise in my life to know the character and promise of God even on a hike is the same sort of stillness that God invited Israel to walk in Psalm 46:10.

Don't allow a swarm of trials or the busyness of the Christmas season to choke out your understanding of the fact that God is with you. He is ruling all the created order from His throne, but He is also with you in the times that you need a comforting Father by your side. He is set apart as a holy and mighty God, but He is also with those oppressed and low in spirit (Isaiah 57:15).

# GOD'S CLOSE PRESENCE IN THE GOSPEL

There is no more clear way that God has shown how personal and near He is to us than in the gospel itself. The incarnation of Christ shows that God is not far from any of us. Even though He made the world, He chose to come to the world as a man so that those who believe in Him could become His children (John 1:10-12).

The nearness of God does not stop with Jesus stepping into the world as a man. He goes on from His birth to live a sinless

life that we could not live so that He could give Himself up as the perfect sacrifice for our sins (1 Peter 1:19). In doing so, we are sanctified through Jesus for all time (Hebrews 10:10). The distance between a holy God and a sin-soaked man has been bridged by the work of Jesus. Because of Jesus we can draw near to God with our hearts clean and our bodies washed in purity (10:22). A high and holy God has made a way for us to draw near to Him—all by His work and grace.

### GOD WITH US IN HIS MISSION

God does not stop there at our salvation in terms of being near to us. He also brings us into His mission of restoring the lost unto Himself. He calls His church to go out into the world and proclaim this gospel of grace to all we meet. He asks His church to make disciples just as He made disciples of the twelve men who

followed Him (Matthew 28:19). Yet, God kindly does not leave us on our own in the mission. He promises to be with us until He returns again (28:20) and promises to supply us strength (Philippians 4:13) and supply our needs that we may bring Him glory (4:19-20).

In His character, in His gospel, and in His mission, God wants you to know that He is always with you. It might not always feel like He is though. There will be times of trial and chaos that can seem to wipe that reality away, but that is just the fog of our feelings and circumstances. That is why we remind ourselves daily that He won't leave us (Deuteronomy 31:8) and that He is near all who call out to Him (Psalm 145:18). Know that He loves you, He is with you, and He is near you. Remind yourself daily of God's presence in your life, trusting the promise of Psalm 73:28 that says His presence is your good.







# SCRIPTURES ARE CONFIRMED

### + SESSION IN A SENTENCE:

In appearing to His followers, the risen Jesus gave them, and all who believe, peace, hope, and confidence.

### + BACKGROUND PASSAGE:

Luke 24

### + SETTING:

Luke 24 opens on resurrection morning, when some women bringing spices for the body of Jesus found the stone rolled away from His tomb and two gleaming angels instead. The mourning women were terrified, but Jesus had risen! The women told the disciples, who thought the women were out of their minds, but Peter went to see the open tomb. That same day, two disciples heading to Emmaus encountered a stranger who seemed to be completely unaware of Jesus and His tragic death. The most exciting part of the world's greatest story was just beginning.

READ:

Luke 24:36-43

**FOCAL PASSAGE:** 

Luke 24:36

NOTES

I saved up \$700 for my first car and bought one from my dad's best friend. I sold that car to my sister and bought another from a family we'd known for years. I drove that car all through college, but after graduating I decided to move up in vehicle.

So at 22 years old, I was getting ready to sell a car to a stranger for the first time. The buyer had called, and we had scheduled a time to meet. I had the title in hand, and he assured me he had cash. But at the last minute, I got cold feet: What if this guy had bad intentions? Would he rob me and steal my car? So I did the only thing I knew to do: I asked my dad to be there for the transaction. I walked in with confidence and peace, not because of my own strength or confidence in the buyer's integrity, but because my bear-of-a-man father was standing there.

Perhaps that's the feel of today's focal passage: Though the disciples were startled, Jesus proclaimed peace over them. Jesus was present, and with Jesus present, peace was present. The same is true for us today.

In what situation are you lacking peace today? Can you see Jesus in this situation? How does that change your peace level?

FOCAL PASSAGE:

Matthew 14:26-27

# **KEY DOCTRINE #23: GOD IS TRANSCENDENT**

God's transcendence refers to the fact that He is distinct from and independent of His created world. He is transcendent over us in regards to His greatness and power as well as His goodness and purity. The implication of this doctrine is that God is inherently superior to humanity; His thoughts and ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9). When God saves us. He restores us so we can fulfill our human purpose; this does not mean that we become God or that distinctions between God and humanity are obliterated. Understanding God's transcendence evokes awe and wonder at His goodness and power.

In this week's focal passages, the disciples huddled together in a room were startled and terrified when Jesus appeared because they thought they had seen a ghost (Luke 24:37). It seems that's the first conclusion their thinly-stretched minds had locked on when the crucified and supposedly-dead Jesus appeared to them in bodily form.

The funny thing is that this wasn't the first time they mistook Jesus for a ghost. In Matthew 14, the disciples were in a boat headed across the Sea of Galilee, battered by a storm. When Jesus came, walking on the sea early in the morning (Matthew 14:25), again their brains went immediately to the conclusion that it was a ghost.

I had a similar experience years ago. While walking through a commercial haunted house with friends—already on edge—I was grabbed and lifted into the air by one of the "monsters." Instantly paralyzed with fear, I couldn't for my life figure out how I would leave that amusement place alive. But then I heard a familiar voice whisper, "It's me, Denny." One of my good friends had played a prank; I instantly felt peace.

Hear Jesus's words today in your own life: "It is I" (Matthew 24:27). Don't be afraid.

Have you taken time today to be truly still and hear the voice of the Lord?

READ:

Luke 24:36-43

**FOCAL PASSAGE:** 

Luke 24:38-40

NOTES

One of my friends has a really neat computer case. It's split down the middle vertically. The left side of the case says, "Left brain," and describes what a predominantly left-brain, or analytical, person tends to do or be or think. The color scheme on this side of the case is black and white, the typeface is traditional, and the background image appears to be something from a newspaper. The right side of the case is awash in brilliant colors. It's heading, "Right brain," is written in a scripted font, and it describes the characteristics of a predominantly right-brain, or artistic, person. I remember this case vividly because of the woman who owns it. Raleigh is the epitome of a right-brained person. Artistic, flamboyant, and colorful in all she does, her gorgeous personality lights up a room.

But that wasn't Jesus. He wasn't flashy and likely didn't stand out in a crowd. But He changed humanity forever. When He appeared to His disciples in Luke 24, He didn't appeal to the vivid, imaginary parts of their brains; He went to the logical side, inviting them to see and touch. Glory to the One who crafts each sunrise and still sets all the universe in order. We praise Him for His logic as well as His artistry.

How have you seen God through logic or analytics? How have you experienced Him in creativity?

READ:

Luke 24:44-49

FOCAL PASSAGE:

Luke 24:44-45

NOTES

If you read the book of Matthew, you'll see the word "fulfilled" several times. It's a rich Greek word, carrying with it the idea of making full, complete, filled to the brim, or perfect. Matthew, our resident Hebrew writer of his Gospel, went out of his way to point out when something from the Old Testament Scriptures had been fulfilled (see Matthew 2:15,17).

Jesus didn't just check off the list of Messiah prophecies (though there were hundreds); He completed them perfectly. Some of the prophecies even seemed contradictory: the promised One would come from Galilee, Egypt, and Bethlehem; God managed to make each of them come to pass when His Son was still an infant, dependent on the decisions of His earthly parents. Jesus lived perfectly, died sacrificially, and arose triumphantly.

When He appeared to His disciples, Jesus reminded them that He had told them that everything written about Him must be "fulfilled" (Luke 24:44). In pointing His learners back to the Scriptures, He reminded them not only that He is exactly who He said He was, but also that God is faithful. Even today, we can find confidence in studying the Old Testament and seeing signs pointing us to Christ. As Paul wrote in Romans 15:4, the past writings were written to give us hope through the endurance and encouragement of Scripture.

How can studying God's fulfilled promises in the Bible strengthen your faith even today?

READ:

Luke 24:44-49

FOCAL PASSAGE:

Luke 24:46-49

NOTES

Jesus told His disciples that they would be witnesses to His suffering, death, and resurrection so that repentance for forgiveness of sins would be proclaimed to all the nations starting in Jerusalem (Luke 24:47), the very city where He was killed. I wish I could see the visible reaction of the disciples to that city: Jerusalem was where they were hiding at that moment, locked in a room for fear of the local religious authorities. Jerusalem probably wasn't a desired location for anyone affiliated with Jesus. Perhaps some of them were looking to get out at the first opportunity.

But we cannot forget that God loved Jerusalem; it was David's city. God had stopped the angel bringing a plague as it got to the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite (2 Samuel 24:16), which is the exact place where David purchased the site for the temple. Hundreds of years before that, it had been called Mount Moriah, the place where Abraham had been willing to offer his only son as a sacrifice (Genesis 22:2; 2 Chronicles 3:1). In that same city, God would not resist the offering of His only Son.

So it wasn't much of a surprise that the best news ever—the offer of forgiveness for our sins—would also begin in Jerusalem.

What place holds a special significance in your heart? How has God shaped you there?

When God saves us, He restores us so we can fulfill our human purpose; this does not mean that we become God or that distinctions between God and humanity are obliterated. Understanding God's transcendence evokes awe and wonder at His goodness and power.



How can we apply our knowledge of God's transcendence to our lives?

# **POINT 2: The risen Messiah overcomes doubts** (Luke 24:38b-43).

Jesus doesn't minimize or dismiss the confusion and doubts of His disciples; instead, He gives them the opportunity to experience and find confidence in Him.



What have you experienced in the past that made you doubt God and how did Jesus reveal Himself in it?

Even when doubting, we can be confident that Jesus will demonstrate the truthfulness of who He is as He wants us to find the joy of assurance and salvation.



How do we help others (or ourselves) when we face doubts about God or His Word?

# **POINT 3: The risen Messiah fulfills Scripture** (Luke 24:44-49).

Jesus still opens minds, allowing us to understand how He fulfills the Scriptures, being our Messiah who grants forgiveness of sin to those who repent.



From Day 4: How can studying God's fulfilled promises in the Bible strengthen your faith even today?

Jesus calls His disciples to be His witnesses, knowing that we have the promise of the Holy Spirit.



How are we called to be witnesses today?

### MY RESPONSE

Because what the Scriptures teach about Jesus is trustworthy, we preach Jesus with complete confidence and unwavering boldness.

- HEAD: How can you point your eyes back to the Lord when circumstances are stealing your peace?
- HEART: How can you praise God for how He pursues you and reveals Himself even in your doubts and fears?
- HANDS: What words or actions this week have revealed that you are a witness to Jesus our Lord?
